Life in abundance?

Tad Huw writes:

We are in the season of our Harvest festivals, a time of joy and thanksgiving for all the great gifts of creation, for the world that God has given, that gives us life and sustains us.

But it's a feast I find quite strange to celebrate. In years gone by it was a huge festival, but then almost all of us would have been living directly off the land, and if we didn't directly then we would have been growing our own produce in our gardens. In these days of global commerce, however, fewer and fewer jobs are dependent on working the land, and even if they are, then whether it is a poor year or a good year, a good harvest or a poor one, our food supplies are still secure and throughout the year you can buy all that you want whether it's in season or not.

There is a great disconnect, especially in western nations, between the land, our climate, and our survival. And yet, even if we don't feel it, even when we don't experience it, we are still all dependent on creation, dependent on the land and all that it produces, gifts of God and work of human hands.

In the last few years especially, there has been a resurgence of understanding, of understanding of our dependence upon the earth beneath our feet. This has largely been brought about by the climate emergency. It is now virtually universally accepted that we as a species are destroying the planet through our consumption and pollution. This year we have again broken

through the 1.5° temperature rise that governments across the world had vowed to avoid. We are heading rapidly towards the 2° threshold at which scientists agree there will irrevocable damage to the climate systems of our earth and our very survival will be in jeopardy. There are places on our planet this summer that became so hot that human life could not survive outside. That is terrifying. I don't know about you, but I, personally, find that incredibly scary.



However I also know that the debate around climate change is not always accessible. It seems to be so large a thing that we just can't see what we, as individuals, or even in our community, can do. It's so vast a problem that we are almost paralysed into inaction. The other aspect of the debate is also quite hard for us to grasp because it's always about reduction reduce, re-use, recycle. It's all about doing less, using less, being less, and I find it hard to reconcile that with our God who is a God of abundance.

I remember meeting a lad who was suffering badly with climate anxiety. He listened to the news, he read the papers, and he saw so much on social media, all of it pointing to the cliff edge we are hurtling towards. The message was clear - change the way you live or the whole planet is doomed. So he did. He measured his carbon footprint and he was horrified, so he set about reducing his consumption. He gave up on holidays, he gave up meat, he looked at the miles his food travelled and he reduced to only eating locally produced vegetables. He gave up his car and driving. He re-measured and was still horrified by his carbon footprint. He gave up all plastic, he gave up even on public transport and walked everywhere. It came to a point where even his socks were made from sustainable bamboo, and still when he measured his carbon footprint it was too large. He came to the conclusion that the planet would have been better off if he'd never existed.

Imagine feeling that, that the very breath you draw, that simply by existing, you are harming God's creation. And that is the problem with the climate debate and the way it is framed. It's all negative. It is all about reducing, about reaching carbon zero, and eventually reducing yourself to nothing. That is not a good argument if you want people to act, and nor is it a Christian argument in the debate. God does not want us to be nothing, God wants only good things for us, God want us to have life and have it abundantly.

So what then should we as Christians, celebrating the goodness and abundance of God's gifts, say to the climate change debate? Certainly we can't say nothing, we can't ignore it and continue as we are. So what then should we say?

I'd like to begin answering that with the words of a man most famous for being silent, Charlie Chaplin from his 1940 film The Great Dictator –

"I should like to help everyone...
We all want to help one another,
Human beings are like that.
We want to live by each other's happiness,
Not by each other's misery...
In this world there is room for everyone.

And the good earth is rich and can provide for everyone.

The way of life can be free and beautiful, But we have lost the way.

Greed has poisoned men's souls,

Has barricaded the world with hate,

Has goose-stepped us into misery and bloodshed.

We have developed speed, but we have shut ourselves in,

Machinery that gives abundance has left us in want.

Our knowledge has made us cynical.

Our cleverness, hard and unkind.

We think too much and feel too little.

More than machinery we need humanity.

More than cleverness we need kindness

and gentleness.

Without these qualities, life will be violent and all will be lost...

In the 17th chapter of St Luke it is written: "The Kingdom of God is within man"

Not in one man nor a group of men,
But in all men! In you!..."

Not a bad place to start, the natural goodness within humanity, our natural want and need for connection to others, to want to help and be good to others. Then to admit that we have lost the way, as a society, as a species - that with all our technology, all our gadgets and trinkets, we have shut ourselves in and never been more isolated as individuals - and to start to look around and ask "Surely there is a better way for us to live".

And then we begin, small and slowly to start. We start by asking not is there way of reducing my life, of being carbon neutral, of halting the negativity my life has, but instead by looking around, by seeing - truly seeing the glory of God's creation - in the garden, in the hills and fields that surround us, in the myriad of daily miracles that are everywhere if we but pause long enough to see them. And we can say to ourselves "How do I add to this, how do I live positively for others, for the glory of God and betterment of this gift which he created, yes for all of us, but also for me, personally?"

Whether that's leaving the fallen leaves for hedgehogs to nest in over winter, planting wild



flowers, leaving grass to grow a little longer, putting up nest boxes, ensuring our electricity is from renewable sources - re-frame the argument - "I'm not driving less to reduce my footprint, instead I'm walking more so I can truly see, smell, touch the beauty of all that surround me." As we give thanks for the bounty and plenty of this world, let us learn again to live lives of thanks that add and return to the gift of creation which not only sustains us but brings us joy beyond anything created by man. And as we

add to this earth, I wonder what new joys it will bring forth for us.

That speech by Charlie Chaplain ends

"Look up...

The soul of man has been given wings, And at last he is beginning to fly, He is flying into the light of hope, Into the future, The glorious future that belongs To you, to me and to all of us"

Let us as Christians in the climate crisis debate be the ones who remind humanity that we do indeed have wings, and that by flying towards the light of hope we find in God, we can live into a good future that is found when we live lives of hope and love, in service to others and all of creation, living positively, giving back in thanks to the gift of God's creation that demands that we have life, and life in abundance.

A reminder that our churches are celebrating Harvest on Sunday 5th October (except for St David's who marked it on 28th September). This year our gifts and donations will go to our Aberconwy Missionn Area Care & Share Project.

Those who made it to the celebration service earlier in September will know that this project reaches right across the Mission Area, from Llanrwst to the coast. We were introduced to the officers - Chair Alan McKinnell, Secretary Julie Regan, Treasurer Alison Foxall, Norman Garland who plays an invaluable role

in handling enquiries and referrals and dealing with emergency deliveries, and also all the volunteers who help with the deliveries.

It was clear that there is a real care for those who are in difficulty, and the continuity of contact between a volunteer and the families they deliver to is very much valued by all concerned. This is shown by the adoption of the Dignity Charter for Users of Community Food Support and the opportunity for those who receive support to also contribute. It was also obvious that the project is much respected by other organisations, as the list of those who refer to Care & Share covers a wide range of statutory and voluntary organisations working in this field. An important aspect of the service the project offers is an emergency response. Very few organisations can provide this 'out of hours' and Norman is always ready to respond to emergency referrals with an immediate delivery of essentials from the store kept at St Michael's.

This project is a very real demonstration of sharing Christ's love with the community - part of our Mission Area 'strapline'. At the end of the PowerPoint presentation during the service there was a summary of the work and ethos of the project:

- The underpinning ethos of Aberconwy Care and Share is to demonstrate God's love to those in our community
- We try to show the same love and care that you would show to a loved member of your family or your best friend who fell on hard times
- We are inclusive no-one is left out
- We try not to judge
- We listen and respond in a spirit of compassion to what we hear


St David's Toy Drive!




